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Arbor Day Tree Sales: Aurora Forestry staff is preparing for the annual Arbor Day tree sale. Arbor Day is April 19 in Colorado. To celebrate, Aurora will once again offer citizens high-quality trees at deep discounts. Residents may call Forestry and reserve an air purifying tree to plant on their property. The 2013 tree sale selection includes English Oak (\$38), Hot Wings Tatarian Maple (\$38), Pacific Sunset Maple (\$27 for whips), and Summer Charm Tree Lilac (\$38). Trees must be paid for in advance and tree pick-up day is Saturday, April 20 at Aurora Central Facilities, 13646 East Ellsworth Ave. For complete tree descriptions and ordering information, visit www.auroragov.org/trees. Aurora's Green Revolution Arbor Day Festival and Plant Sale is 10 am–3 pm Saturday, April 20, at the municipal campus. This collaborative event is your chance to learn more about becoming "green" in your own home and in your community. Watch for additional details as Arbor Day approaches.

The Overland High School Baseball Booster Club: The Blazers Booster Club was formed two years ago, and with the help of many community members, local businesses, and supportive OHS staff members, improvements to the aesthetics and playing conditions of Schenbeck baseball field in Utah Park have been made. Since September 2012, the Blazer Booster parent members, coaches, and baseball players have resodded the infield and purchased 20 tons of new dirt for the infield. The dugouts were remodeled, with new benches installed, new concrete floors and fresh paint. The district replaced the chain link fencing on the backstop and the dugouts, as well as provided new batting cages. During every Overland High School baseball game, burgers, hot dogs and other baseball treats will be available for purchase by spectators and the public. The Booster Club noted that Councilwoman Molly Markert supported these efforts.

Crime Prevention Tip: The winter months usually equal cold mornings, and make it tempting to start your vehicle and leave it unattended while it warms up (puffers). This provides an easy target for car thieves. Approximately 30 auto thefts occurred during one weekend and almost all of them were puffers. It is illegal to leave a vehicle running unattended in Aurora, and the police department participates in periodic puffer operations — officers troll parking lots for puffers and issue tickets to violators. Please stay with your vehicle when it is running.

Did you know that Heather Ridge Neighborhood Watch (NW) receives continual notifications and/or messages from the Aurora Police Department, PAR Officer, City-Wide Head Area Coordinator, and others who are concerned about our safety? In addition, NW is updated on crime statistics, in or around Aurora. It is notified about events — like important classes being held in the area. There is so much more that you need to know. You may be missing important information.

You probably are aware — because of the information you read in Heather Ridge *Metro Matters* and the flyers posted on your door — that approximately every four months Neighborhood Watch hosts a meeting in the community, with a guest speaker. Your attendance and input could be valuable.

All Heather Ridge residents may not know there is an easy way to receive all this information. If you do not already have your e-mail address on file with an Account Coordinator or Block Captain in your community, you are really missing out! If you are hesitant about giving out your e-mail address, don't be! You can receive this information in your e-mail inbox by requesting it be sent to you as a "blind copy." Blind copy simply means you request the information come only to you. **No one else sees your e-mail address! It is not visible for the world to see!**

(Please note if you wish to receive the e-mails via blind copy.) If you get an answering machine, please leave the information or ask the Account Coordinator to call you back.

Home Sales Soar

Home sales and prices continue their 2013 ascent to surpass 2007 real estate activity — the high water mark before the recent crash. The only dark cloud is an unlikely suspect — too little inventory, especially below \$200,000. Homeowners have recently returned to a semblance of solvency, but many are hesitant to sell. Who can blame them? It's been a rough past five years.

February home prices rose as “for sale” inventory fell to the lowest level since 1985, according to MLS and Gary Bauer. As of March 6, only 6,786 homes were for sale, down 4.3 percent from January 2013, and down 32.7 percent from 10,086 in February 2012.

Prices continue upward with lower-priced homes rising the fastest — the market is recovering from the bottom up! Compared to a year ago, February prices increased 11 percent, and the number of homes under contract grew 13.6 percent.

Today's average single-family home price is \$276,596, up \$28,531 from a year ago. Condos are up \$21,214, to \$175,351. Metro Denver's growth rates exceed national figures making it one of the top 10 major real estate growth markets.

This and That: With spring and summer approaching, some CH residents may be working on home improvements. Please remember to contact Accord Property Management to fill out the proper request forms for all outside improvements such as replacing windows,

installing and replacing screen doors, and all grounds improvement.

Parking is still an issue:

The board will discuss the need to improve/re-evaluate parking rules, and is asking all residents to park at least one car in the garage.

A few months ago CH board installed bright orange containers with ice melt throughout the property. The board also installed seven white real estate boxes for the Heather Ridge *Metro Matters* magazine to be distributed on a monthly basis. Several orange containers went missing and one white box has been taken down several times. It reappeared recently. Removing HOA property is against the law. Please call the management company if you have any questions about items installed on the property.

Monthly HOA Meetings: CH monthly HOA Board meetings are scheduled to convene on the third Thursday of every month in the card room on the lower level in the golf course clubhouse. (Enter through the men's locker room). The next monthly meeting will be 6 pm Thursday, April 18. All Chimney Hill residents are welcome to attend.

Country Club Ridge by Judie Maurelli



Water Usage: As reported last month, water usage is one of Country Club Ridge's biggest budget items. One might feel that the water is paid for by Country Club Ridge. But the reality is that it is your dollars, in the form of monthly HOA dues that pays all expenses. It has been discovered that some units use significantly more water than others, even though the number of residents within each building is similar. Working with Aurora Water, Country Club Ridge learned how to conduct internal water audits looking for a variety of leaks that consume water. Three buildings have had Smart Water sensors installed to monitor usage 24 hours a day for a 30-day period. Additional details about water usage will be available when the internal water audits are completed.

How Can I Help? Check all faucets for dripping water and make any repairs. Flow-restricting aerators for all faucets are available at home improvement stores for \$3–5 each. Check toilets for tank leaks by placing a dye tablet in the tank; wait for 15 minutes and check the bowl. If color is seeping into the bowl — you have a leak! This is a great time of year to test for leaks. In addition to commercial dye tablets, you can use Easter egg dye tablets (dissolve tablet in one cup of water before adding to the tank), old coffee or tea, or food coloring drops.

Contrary to belief that you will “hear” a malfunctioning toilet, these leaks do not make a sound! If a leak is detected, all home improvement stores sell the repair parts. The average toilet in the community uses 1.6 gallons of water per flush. However, the industry standard now is 1.28 gallons per flush, with 1 gallon per flush units available. If you need to replace a toilet, please look for the low-flow units.

Wash full loads of clothes. If you are shopping for a new washer, consider a low-usage front loader with an Energy Star rating. Use your dishwasher instead of hand washing dishes. Not only do you benefit from cleaner dishes, you save water.

New Contractor for Waste Removal: Alpine Waste Removal has been contracted to be Country Club Ridge's garbage and recycling provider beginning on April 1. You will receive a letter giving you details about when you will receive a new garbage tote and when the old ones will be picked up. If you are now



reminder, and information to the newest renters, please do not wash your car on Fairway 16 property. The board is trying to keep the water bills under control. Also, please supervise small children who ride their tricycles or bikes in driveways; it isn't always easy to see them when backing out of a garage.

Squirrel Control: Have squirrels attacked your patio cushions and removed the stuffing? This was a problem for at least two homeowners last spring and summer. Aurora Animal Control recommends buying fox urine and spreading it around your patio or area where the cushions are. It is available at Bass Pro Shop in the Northfield Shopping area, located at I-70 and Quebec, 1 ounce for \$6.

Thanks: To the mystery shoveler who shoveled the snow off the long 16th Fairway cart path on February 27. It was helpful to joggers and dog walkers, but was not done by either the golf course staff or Fairway 16 shoveling crew. Just know — you were appreciated!

Installing Concrete Drain Pans: Approximately 100 five-foot drain pans are scheduled to be installed on driveway downspouts in the near future. The board recently approved a \$4,000 budget to reduce water and ice problems by discharging it farther away from buildings. Installation will supersede decorative flowerpots and such, so please make note.

Commercial Vehicles on Site: The board is receiving more and more complaints about commercial and work trucks parked in the community. It is important to make a distinction between public roads like South Wheeling and Xanadu versus interior roads owned by HRS. Aurora oversees public roads by noting, ticketing, and towing violators. HRS governs interior roads per its Declarations and Rules and Regulations. Complaints include repairing commercial vehicles in front of units along with

multiple vehicle parking. Commercial vehicles are limited to property visits only. Otherwise, they must park on public roads and not on HRS grounds or driveways.

Join the Board, Get a Free Meal: Yes, it's true! Each year the board is entitled to fete itself, per the annual budget (for those budget watchers, it's authorized in our Declarations). Being the frugal board it is, HRS usually caters the dinner at the community clubhouse. Board members, spouses, and significant others enjoy a fun evening celebrating their services for the year. If you would like to learn more about joining the board, please contact Janelle or a board member.

Welcome New Owners: Although there have been few sales recently, "welcome new and newer residents." After each closing, Westwind Management sends a Welcome Package with pertinent information. HRS is a Condo, Not a Town Home Community: The HOA maintains exteriors and ground areas with few exceptions. Front and back patios along with driveways are for the exclusive use of occupants. Fencing rear patios requires written approval along with windows, doors, skylights, garage doors, etc. The best rule is to call first to avoid problems. Yes, that's Janelle you call.







While married couples dominate the market, single buyers are the fastest-growing segment




What are Americans buying?

The pre-owned-home market still dominates housing purchases




What ethnicity are homebuyers?

Grounding Breaking for I-225 Rail Line Project

On March 1, more than 250 people watched as the groundbreaking ceremony took place at the future site of the RTD Aurora City Center Station.

This 10.5-mile rail line along I-225 will include eight stations, traveling through Aurora and a section of Denver. It will connect passengers along the Southeast


“Last May, we started construction on the portion of the I-225 Rail Line from the existing Nine Mile Station to Iliff,” said Tom Tobiassen, RTD Board Director, District F. “Little did we know that less than a year later, we’d be starting construction on the entire line, and in just a few short years from now we’ll be celebrating the opening of the line.”

Kiewit Infrastructure Company will build the rest of the I-225 rail project northbound to Peoria and Smith Road. The Smith/Peoria Station is where the I-225 Light Rail Line will connect with the East Rail Line to Denver International Airport and downtown to Denver Union Station (DUS).



Light Rail Line from Nine Mile Station to the City Center of Aurora, Aurora Municipal Center, Anschutz-Fitzsimons Medical Campus, the new VA Hospital and Children’s Hospital, in addition to the East Line to the airport.


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HRCA Update: Golf Course Communities Outperform Others

Golf Digest and Business Week magazine recently surveyed 40 golf communities nationwide to see how well they survived the economic downturn. Selecting destination and vacation home communities, they developed profiles of the five strongest and weakest markets, and much to no one's surprise, golf communities did better than non-golf communities.

Although Heather Ridge is not a destination or resort community, the golf course adds value to its 10 communities, and Aurora in general. Heather Ridge welcomes everyone, creating a diversity not normally found in "gated or age restricted" communities. As the housing market improves, Heather Ridge will outperform others because its citizens and taxpayers saved the open space best used as a golf course.

Center operates in the Department of Regulator Agencies (DURA) under the Real Estate Commission. Last year, all Colorado HOAs had to register and pay a funding fee of \$50. Created in response to growing complaints and concerns, the HOA Office will attempt to monitor two of the fastest growth industries in Colorado — HOAs and HOA management companies.

The five strongest markets included Vail; the Oregon region east and west of the Cascade Mountains; Park City, Utah; the Myrtle Beach area in South Carolina; and the High Country of North Carolina near Charlotte. The five weakest were northern Michigan, Palm Springs, California; Reno, Nevada; Sarasota, Florida; and Scottsdale, Arizona.

Golf course homes and communities are not immune from market trends, but the Scottsdale study observed: while overall market prices dropped 4.1 percent, golf course values rose 1.4 percent. The same phenomenon happened in other market studies, reflecting the notion that buyers prefer golf communities. Golf course lots are priced up to 40 percent higher than non-golf lots reflecting community features, proximity to open space golf courses, and economic-income issues.

Controlling documents govern all HOA communities: Called Declarations or CC&Rs (covenants, conditions, and restrictions), these documents may stipulate administrative costs such as HOA fees, working capital contributions, recording and transfers fees, or providing disclosure documents to buyers (newsletters, financial statements, budgets, declarations, etc.). These fees should be reasonable, but one person's "reasonable" may be another's outrage.

Created in 2010, the Colorado HOA Information Office and Resource

Court Reduces HOA \$500 Transfer Fee: An Arapahoe County small-claims court recently overturned a homeowners' association transfer fee, allowing the seller to recover

Of the 600 formal complaints the HOA Office received last year, these were the most common ones:

House Bill 1134, if approved, would expand the authority and responsibilities of the HOA Office in concert with two other pending bills. Among the issues being debated by the Colorado legislature are licensing and regulating property management companies, and reforming HOA foreclosure laws, limiting HOAs to specify amounts (yet to be determined). Other provisions being discussed are to limit transfer fees to \$50, to cap administrative fees and fines, and limit add-ons to HOA homeowners' debt.

HOAs Need to Watch Laws for Growing Pot: With Colorado's passage of the new marijuana laws, HOAs needs to be thinking about its impact on their communities. Guidelines approved in Referendum

64 will become regulation soon. Concerning private cultivation, up to six plants may be grown for personal use per household in safe, controlled locations. Outdoor plants must be secure in locked structures. A person's right to grow might conflict with HOA oversight of common and limited common areas. Issues could include general safety, attractive nuisance and erecting structures for growing plants. Board discussions should start before springtime planting.

Real Estate Market Briefs

• *Metro Denver Small Property Vacancies Fall.* Vacancies in for-rent townhomes, single-family homes, and other small properties fell during the fourth quarter of 2012 to 1.7 percent. It was 2.1 percent in the fourth quarter of 2011, and 2.3 percent in the third quarter of 2012. The lowest vacancy rates are in Jefferson and Douglas counties, 1.3 and 1.2 percent respectively.

• *Stapleton Ranks 10th on Top-Seller List of Planned Communities.* According to John Burns Real Estate Consulting (Irvine, California), Stapleton ranks 10th in planned communities. Surveying 100 communities and ranking the top 50 across the United States, Stapleton was ranked 10th, followed by Highlands Ranch, 12th; and The Meadows in Castle Rock, 37th.

• *Colorado Mountain Housing Market Rebounds.* Realtors report sales and prices in six mountain communities have rebounded to 2007 levels by the end of 2012. Crashing in 2009, sales in the six Colorado resort counties have rebounded. The average Aspen sales price for 2012 was \$4.2 million.

• *January's Metro Area Luxury Homes Edged Up Higher Over January 2011.* Forty-five homes sold in January, down from December's blistering-hot 65 sales. The median

price remains the same as last year's, \$1.25 million.

• *Colorado Delinquency Rate Falls for Mortgages.* The Mortgage Bankers Association now ranks Colorado 46th in delinquencies and 43rd in foreclosures started. The delinquency rate for all Colorado mortgages at the end of 2012 was 4.72 percent, a very different situation than three years ago when Colorado was the nation's poster child for foreclosures.

• *Mortgage Forgiveness Debt Relief Act Good for One More Year.* Set to expire December 31, 2012, Congress extended the Debt Relief Act for 2013. Created in 2007 to deal with the tax consequences of foreclosure, short sales and mortgage modifications, struggling sellers won't be taxed in 2013. During the housing crash, up to 40 percent of all sales included mortgage debt forgiveness, a significant factor to the housing recovery.

Keep your gardens and lawn healthy during hot, dry summer

Forecasters are predicting a hot, dry summer. Although Mother Nature can surprise us sometimes and deliver a lot of springtime snow, it doesn't look like that will happen at this point. Our water supply is dependent on snowmelt, so if we don't get significant snow in the next couple of months, it's possible we could ask City Council to approve additional watering restrictions. You can still maintain an attractive landscape and use water efficiently. Here are some tips:

Plants and Trees

- Mature trees benefit from supplemental water during warm and dry weather. Trees should receive 10 gallons/month for every inch of trunk diameter.
- Mulch 3 to 4 inches of organic or inorganic material. The mulch will help to retain moisture in the soil and reduce weeds.
- Water deeply and infrequently. Most perennials, shrubs and trees can be watered once a week or less.

Lawns

- Don't bag your grass clippings. Returning your grass clippings to your lawn can significantly reduce the need to fertilize.
- Fertilize your grass during the spring and fall, not during the hottest months.
- Mow your grass between 2.5 and 3 inches and mow often enough that only a third of the grass height is removed mowing. Keep the mower blade sharp.
- Aeration is more beneficial than power raking. Aerate in both the spring and fall.
- To create deep root growth, water deeply and infrequently without creating run-off. Footprints or lawn mower tracks that remain at least a half-hour after traffic has passed indicates water is needed. Grass will also get a blue-gray tint when it is stressed and needs water.
- Most areas of your lawn have enough natural moisture in the soil to start growing. Turf on slopes or that face south and west might need additional water.
- Wait until May to start using your automatic sprinkler system.

Automatic Sprinkler Systems

- When you turn on your sprinkler system for the season, complete a thorough walk-through to check for leaks and damage.
- Adjust your clock monthly, according to changes in weather, and check regularly for leaks and damaged equipment. Test your system each month to ensure nothing needs to be repaired.
- Use the "Cycle and Soak" watering method. Water for half the time and allow the water to soak in for an hour, then water for the remaining time. This helps reduce run-off especially on slopes. Depending on the slope and soil type, you may need to run three times.
- The best time to water is at night between 10 p.m. and 6 a.m. Remember that our city ordinances are written with conservation in mind and prohibit watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- Refer to the www.aurorawater.org website for watering time recommendations.
- Aurora water also offers free irrigation systems audits. Call 303-739-7351 to schedule yours today.

Vegetables

- Mulch around your vegetables with straw, shredded leaves or grass clippings.
- Prepare the ground a month before planting with high quality compost that is stable and low in salts.
- In the early season vegetables don't require much water - the plants are small and the root zones aren't established. Water these plants frequently but with only a bit of water directed to the root zone.
- Don't worry if your plants look a bit wilted in the afternoon sun. Check your plants in the morning to see if you need to water.
- Water close to the root of the plant. Watering the leaves makes plants more susceptible to disease.


